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CR-05 - Goals and Outcomes

Progress the jurisdiction has made in carrying out its strategic plan and its action plan. 91.520(a)

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) awards Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds to "Entitlement Communities" across the United States. Awards are based on formula calculations including factors such as the population of the community, pre-1940's housing stock, growth and decline. The City of Greenwood, located south of Indianapolis, Indiana, in Johnson County finished its third year (Program Year 2021) as an Entitlement Community. During the third year, the City received an allocation of the Community Development Block Grant (\$329,172).

The City's 2021 program year (PY2020) began on October 1, 2021 and ended September 30, 2022. This document is the Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report (CAPER), or year end report, to discuss the accomplishments from PY2021. The City of Greenwood focused in expanding public services in the community and continuing improvements at Northeast Park with the addition of an all-weather trail. The PY2021 year included some new organizations offering to provide services in the community. Of the three different service providers new to the CDBG program, two were able to successfully complete their programs. One program returned their funds and it was immediately reallocated to the trail project.

During the previous program year, the city continued to spend down its Community Development Block Grant Coronavirus (CDBG-CV) funding. As the COVID-19 Pandemic became an endemic, the programs who received allocations struggled to spend dollars. The City amended the allocations for a third time on August 4, 2021, moving funds towards public facility improvements at Northeast Park. The new shelter and bathroom, currently on order and delayed due to supply chain issues, will reduce the spread of COVID-19 and other diseases by separating the bathroom from the shelter facility and by making the bathroom a touchless facility.

Assess how the jurisdiction's use of funds, particularly CDBG, addresses the priorities and specific objectives identified in the plan, giving special attention to the highest priority activities identified.

The City of Greenwood has an open application process for local service providers and affordable housing providers to apply for CDBG funding. Through parnterships with local organizations, the City of Greenwood is able to addresses its Consolidated Plan five year goals and Action Plan one-year goals. All service providers applying for a source of federal funding and requiring a certification of consistency with the City's Consolidated Plan, received the certifications in a timely manner.

The City of Greenwood spent over one-half a million dollars of CDBG and CDBG-CV. Four programs received CDBG-CV funded and completed their work in PY2021. Another three projects were awared in PY2020 and completed their work in PY2021. Of the 14 projects that were underway in

some capacity in PY2021, only four of them were current year projects. Meaning four of the projects were awarded on PY2021 and completed or near finished within the same year it was awarded. This has been the first year in which projects awarded in the PY2021 Action Plan were completed or moved forward within the same year and not carried over. The four projects awarded in PY2021 that moved forward include:

- 1. The City of Greenwood incurred administration costs totalling \$31,110. These funds went towards payment of a consultant to help with the oversight of the program, including but not limited to submission of action planning documents and reports to HUD, help with the HUD directed monitoring visit and general oversight/management of subrecipient agreements for compliance with CDBG regulations.
- 2. The City of Greenwood began it's Northeast Park Trail project. The trail underwent construction at the end of September 2022, the end of the program year. The completion of the project occurred in the next program year, PY2022. The beneficiaries will be reported in the next year's CAPER. As a result, the annual goal was not met in PY2021 but will be met in PY2022.
- 3. Bridges of Johnson County used CDBG funding to expand its Circles program, a local chapter of CirclesUSA that connects under-resourced individuals with caring community members and important resources. Within the first quarter of operation, the program has served 3 Greenwood residents. Some programming highlights from the grant term include partnering with the Purdue Extension to host a meeting on nutrition, bringing in a guest speaker and Ph.D. candidate to talk about Implicit Bias. The Circles group also made its first award of a "Barier Buster Grant to a participant in the program. The program benefited 3 Greenwood residents.
- 4. Grace Assembly of God, through it's Great Harvest Program, offered subsistence payments to avoid eviction and disconnection of utilities. One young man stated he was struggling to the point he was ready to be homeless he was already down to one meal a day if he was lucky and the program referred him to a local food pantry for other assistance. Other beneficiaries were able to stop borrowing funds from payday lenders, and avoid the vicious cycle. The program benefited 6 Greenwood residents.

Two different projects from PY2020 carried over into PY2021. The City, to encourage the projects to move forward, gave a deadline of September 30, 2021 to complete their projects. Both projects completed their work in the summer of 2022, moving efforts to improve public facilities and support social services in the community.

- The Greenwood Community Schools added an accessible playground for children with disabilities. More children in the school and in the community have been able to come and play on the equipment, designed especially for them. The kids are thoroughly enjoying the new equipment. The accessibility features help meet the needs of the children.
- United Way of Johnon County offered subsistence payments to prevent eviction of local households in past program year with their PY2020 funding. The program, called No Place to Call Home, assisted 10 different Greenwood households.

Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, HUD awarded a special allocation of CDBG-CARES Act funding called CDBG-CV. Some of these projects were underway and completed in PY2021. Below are a list of accomplishments from PY2021 for projects completed on September 30, 2022.

SS Francis and Clare of Assisi Harvest Food Pantry utilized an addition of \$5,000 of CDBG-CV funds to provide food to people in need as a result of the COVID-19 Pandemic, benefiting 42 individuals. The grant has also allowed Harvest Food Pantry to purchase and distribute personal hygiene products, which the families cannot obtain through the SNAP Program.

Our Lady of Greenwood Food Pantry continued using its CDBG-CV funds to provide food to people in need as a result of the COVID-19 Pandemic, benefiting another 388 individuals in PY2021. The project served 2230 individuals over the course of two years of the pandemic.

Ivy Tech provided job training and education classes for four (4) Greenwood residents. This program was started to help members of the community transition into new careers post COVID. The three programs that were chosen to fund were a certificate in IT Helpdesk Support, Supply Chain & Logisitics and Machine Tool & Maintenace. 30 potential students came forward to apply for funding for these career pathways, however only four students qualified based on income levels to receive funding. Of the four students who started the program in Fall 2021, one was able to complete the three semester program.

Narrative

Activities carried out to meet priorities from the Consolidated Plan and the PY2021 Action Plan were funded from CDBG and CDBG-CV funds. These funds were targeted to meet the greatest needs, and expenditures were directly related to programs that supported the City's Consolidated Plan.

The City of Greenwood expended \$385,165 of CDBG entitlement funds and \$115,482 of CDBG-CV funds. Of the CDBG entitlement funds expended, \$40,801 were funds allocated in PY2020 but expended in PY2021 for activities that occurred in PY2021.

Other projects funded with CDBG-CV funding during, that continue into the PY2021 year include:

- CV Our Lady of the Greenwood Food Pantry with a balance of \$10,988.74
- CV SS Francies and Clare of Assisi Harvest Food Pantry used a balance of \$5,000

The following CDBG-CV funded projects did not move forward or did not ulitize all their funding. The City is reallocating the remaining funding to the Northeast Park Shelter and Bathroom Project. The project will be completed in spring of 2023, once weather allows.

- CV SS Francies and Clare of Assisi Rent Assistance with a balance of \$15,000, \$5,000 was utilized by the Harvest Food Pantry, the remaining \$10,000 reallocated
- CV Greenwood Community Schools with a balance of \$146,400 project utilized \$76,366.28 total with the remaining to be reallocated
- CV Ivy Tech Community College with a balance of \$95,149.84 project utilized \$25,078.27 total with the remaining to be reallocated
- CV Gleaners Food Bank with a balance of \$8,552.20, returned funds due to non-compliance with CDBG-CV funding and reallocating the entire \$10,000 grant

Narrative

Greenwood does not have a specific target area; funds were used city-wide. The City provided programs and services identified in its Consolidated Plan and other local plans to households with the greatest need. Therefore, most activities served eligible low-income households on a citywide basis and these applicants applied for assistance on a program-by-program basis. The City funded park improvements in a low to moderate income neighborhood park, an area of the community with Census Block Group Areas that have the greatest concentrations of low-income households. The park has not received any improvements to its amenities in a substantial time. As such, the City has targeted the park for a variety of improvements.

- 1. The City has used \$292,485 of CDBG funds to complete a multipurpose trail. The City anticipates drawing the remaining \$32,498 of the allocation for that trail in PY2022. The projected involved the installation of a multipurpose trail to the park, increasing the accessibility between the neighborhood and community school.
- 2. The City has allocated \$108,677 towards the development of a new shelter and bathroom. The remaining \$140,608 of CDBG-CV funding will be reallocated towards this project, as construction costs for these projects continue to increase. The project will replace bathroom facilities to be ADA compliant and more accessible to all uses users of the park, separating them from the park's only shelter. This project will enable more residents to enjoy outdoor areas in their neighborhood, where transmission of the COVID-19 virus is low.

Leveraging

Explain how federal funds leveraged additional resources (private, state and local funds), including a description of how matching requirements were satisfied, as well as how any publicly owned land or property located within the jurisdiction that were used to address the needs identified in the plan.

The City of Greenwood reviews applications for funding each year. In it's third year, PY2021, the City received applications for more funding than it had available. Projects that leverage other resources are more competitive and more likely to be funded. This is true for public service projects, as City can only spend 15% of its allocation towards public services. CDBG awards are small and often requiring more funding from other resources. In PY2021, CDBG projects leveraged \$22,361 of other federal funds, \$171,324.09 of state/local funding and \$25,030 of private funding resources to carry out their projects. In addition, CDBG-CV funded projects leveraged \$160,327.53 of other private funds to carry out the supportive service programs.

The City of Greenwood used publically owned land to accomplish one of its goals in PY2021. The City made improvements to Northeast Park at 100 Crestview with CDBG funding, creating a multipurpose trail, conneding the surrounding neighborhood to the trail and local school. The park is tucked between a neighborhood and school, with limited access by vehicle. Because of its non-central location, the park has not received attention or amenity upgrades in recent years. The CDBG funding has provided valuable investment in a park htat is located in census tracts that meet the threshold for low to moderate income area benefit, where more than 51% of the residents are low to moderate income households.

City staff continues to work with those providers to serve Greenwood residents and reach out to organizations in Greenwood who have missions that align with the goals outlined in the Action Plan. Several non-profit service agencies have expressed interest, and the City continued its efforts to find an

interested party in preserving affordable housing. In PY2022, Habitat for Humanity of Johnson County will begin a new home repair program for low to moderate income homeowners in Greenwood. The program will offer minor home repairs, such as roof repair, HVAC repair, accessibility improvements, all in an effort to help these homeowners remain in their homes. The City of Greenwood is excited by this newly formed partnership and looks fowar to reporting the progress made in the next program year's CAPER.

Narrative Information

The City of Greenwood funded the United Way of Johnson County's No Place to Call Home program in its PY2020 Action Plan. During that year, the program did not move forward due to an excess of funding from COVID-19 related funded resources. United Way of Johnson County was able to use these funds in PY2021 to offer susbsitance payments, or rent assistance, to those households facing eviction. Of the 10 households served:

- 4 households were exteremly low income households
- 5 households were low income households
- 1 household was a moderate income household

Evaluate the jurisdiction's progress in meeting its specific objectives for reducing and ending homelessness through:

Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

Greenwood, as part of Johnson County, is part of Region 11 in the State of Indiana Continuum of Care, made up of seven counties: Bartholomew, Brown, Decatur, Jackson, Jennings, Johnson, and Shelby. The council has meetings every other month at Human Services, Inc. in Bartholomew County. The group has taken an active role in the Point in Time Count and is working with a formally homeless individual to help "find" homeless neighbors in the community. The CoC is in the process of strengthening the homeless service network, improving the assessment of the homeless community and its needs, and encouraging more providers to utilize HMIS data tracking systems and Coordinated Entry systems.

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

The City of Greenwood does not have any crisis shelter or emergency beds. Households seeking crisis housing often rely on shelters in neighboring communities.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: likely to become homeless after being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); and, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs

Human Services, Inc. in neighboring Bartholomew County is the only CoC funded program with Rapid Re-Housing program in Region 11. Due to low point in time count numbers in Johnson County and its proximity to Marion County/Indianapolis, homeless services are often found in other counties of the Region where a need and number of homeless individuals is greater.

Through the No Place to Call Home program at the United Way of Johnson County and Grace Assembly of God, the City of Greenwood utilized CDBG funding to prevent the eviction of 16 households.

- Seven (7) of the households earned income below 30% of the area median income, or extremely low income households.
- Six (6) of the households earned income between 31% and 50% of the area median income, or low income households.
- Three (3) of the households earned an income between 51% and 80% of the area median income, or a moderate income household.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

Limited financial resources prohibit the City of Greenwood from supporting any one project or program with a significant amount of funds. CDBG-CV funds were applied to public services most closely associated with need arising from COVID-19, primarily food pantries. Our Lady of Greenwood served 388 people, and Harvest Food Pantry served 42 people.

Actions taken to address the needs of public housing

The City of Greenwood does not have a locally based public housing provider nor a housing choice voucher provider. The State of Indiana, through the Indiana Housing and Community Development Authority subcontracts the housing choice voucher program to Human Services, Inc, to serve Johnson, Shelby, Bartholomew, Decatur, and Jackson Counties. Human Services, Inc. has several locations, but the Johnson County location is in Franklin, IN. There are no public housing units, or multifamily housing owned by a public housing agency, located within the City of Greenwood. Households utilizing housing choice vouchers must locate rental properties that accept housing choice vouchers within the City of Greenwood.

Actions taken to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership

The City of Greenwood asks public service recipients to have available information about affordable housing in all locations where CDBG funded services are provided. Voucher recipients may find information about homeownership opportunities if they receive supportive services from a CDBG supported program.

Actions taken to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment. 91.220 (j); 91.320 (i)

While barriers to affordable housing can come from anywhere, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) recognizes a few universal barriers. Local and state regulations on zoning and building are the most recognized barriers to affordable housing. With increased regulation comes an increased cost to build housing that meets all regulations. The City of Greenwood created a new Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing in Program Year 2019. The document found the following impediments:

- Housing problems are localized in areas of low to moderate income households.
- Higher rates of denials are found in census tracts with higher concentrations of racial minorities.
- The lack of affordable housing in the community affects housing choice and may adversely affect the protected classes.
- Knowledge of fair housing laws and reporting options vary in the community.
- Institutional and regional coordination of enforcement and advocacy needs to improve.

City staff continued outreach to start a new program to address affordable housing. As part of the PY2022 Action Plan planning process, the City identified a new partner, Habitat for Humanity of Johnson County. In the coming program year, the City will work with Habitat for Humanity to provide minor home repairs for low to moderate income homeowners, helping them sustain their housing. The program will be based on successful programs implemented by other affiliates across the country. The City looks forward to reporting the accomplishments in the PY2022 CAPER on this new program.

Actions taken to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The primary obstacle to serving underserved needs in the community is many programs are located outside of Greenwood. While many groups located outside of Greenwood are still helpful to the citizens of Greenwood, the City has focused on funding groups that are located in Greenwood for greater accessibility for neighbors. The following Greenwood-based programs received assistance in PY2021:

- SS Francis and Clare of Assisi Harvest Food Pantry utilized CDBG-CV funds to provide food to people in need as a result of the COVID-19 Pandemic, benefiting 42 individuals, 12 of whom were extremely low income.
- Our Lady of Greenwood Food Pantry utilized CDBG-CV funds to provide food to people in need as a result of the COVID-19 Pandemic, benefiting 388 individuals.
- Greenwood Community Scools used CDBG-CV funds to hire school counselors to connect with families and assesse their needs and connected them to the appropriate resources. The counselors were able to connect 742 students to other resources. Of that number, 388 were

- students from extremely low income households.
- Gracy Assembly of God assisted 6 renter households with subsistence payements or rent & utility payments to prevent eviction or utility shut off.
- Bridges Alliance of Johnson County assisted 3 households with case management, connecting them to other supportive services and mentoring services to achieve financial stability.

Actions taken to reduce lead-based paint hazards. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City will comply with lead-based paint hazards for rehabilitation projects. Prior to the use of federal funds, all existing units will be screened for lead-based paint, if applicable. Housing units identified as having lead-based paint hazards will be treated so the lead-based paint hazards are abated in accordance with federal requirements. The use of lead-based paint is prohibited in newly constructed units.

The City did not undergo any residential construction projects in PY2021.

Actions taken to reduce the number of poverty-level families. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City funded a new program to assist households at-risk of homelessness, Bridges Alliance of Johnson County. Bridges Alliance merges two nationally recognized and proven programs to educate the community, volunteers, and participants, Bridges Out of Poverty and Circles USA. A key piece of that mission is the Circles program, a local chapter of Circles USA is to connect under-resourced individuals with caring community members and important resources. The project served 3 households, 2 of which earned incomes below 30% of the area median income, or extremely low income households.

Actions taken to develop institutional structure. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

The City of Greenwood, as it began the implementation of its CDBG program, noticed a limited capacity of organizations located within Greenwood to support vulnerable resients. Many programs are located in Franklin, IN or Indianapolis, IN, that require Greenwood residents to drive to receive help. With the advent of the CDBG-CV program, the City funded new programs in the community, paritcuarly food pantry programs through faith based groups. These groups, began discussing the need to locate supportive services within Greenwood.

In the PY2022 Action Plan process, the City has received and allocated \$10,000 of CDBG funding for the Coalition for Homelessness. The Coalition for the Homeless is a new initiative to offer immediate aid, prevention, and case management services to our homeless and near homeless neighbors in Johnson County and the City of Greenwood, where there is a lack of coordination between social service providers. With longstanding experience and success in serving, the staff and volunteers of Our Lady of the Greenwood Church will launch the Coalition for the Homeless to coordinate resources and offer one-on-one case management. We will develop an educational component as we work with our neighbors and local public and private agencies to strengthen the social service web of support for those most vulnerable

to becoming homeless in Johnson County and the City of Greenwood. The City will report on the progress made by this Coalition in the next program year CAPER.

Actions taken to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)

In addition to the Coalition for Homelessness, the United Way of Johnson County is the primary way to connect all service providers throughout Greenwood. Once per month, the United Way of Johnson County connects all its partners through a Friday zoom connection. The meeting is an method for private organizations to learn more about services in Johnson County and initiatives of partner organziations. The Network will continue its efforts to build capacity and coordinate service provisions across the county in the coming year. The City of Greenwood has joined this effort and supports institutional coordination among providers.

Identify actions taken to overcome the effects of any impediments identified in the jurisdictions analysis of impediments to fair housing choice. 91.520(a)

The City will use partnerships with State Government, local non-profit housing providers, local public service providers or community development advocacy groups to go beyond the steps listed in this plan to promote fair housing. The City of Greenwood will support other initiatives by the State of Indiana, the City of Indianapolis, and neighboring jurisdictions with their own Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing (AI). Such initiatives may include education programs related to fair housing, homeownership training or landlord/tenant legal services. In PY2021, the City continued its efforts to educate elected and appointed officials by sharing resources available for on-line training resources with the Fair Housing Center of Central Indiana.

Describe the standards and procedures used to monitor activities carried out in furtherance of the plan and used to ensure long-term compliance with requirements of the programs involved, including minority business outreach and the comprehensive planning requirements

Monitoring assures that recipients of federal funds are in compliance with local objectives and federal program requirements. The intent of the City of Greenwood is to work cooperatively with contractors, grantees and sub-recipients in the use of federal funds as best as possible and within reasonable time constraints. The City of Greenwood monitored progress virtually. The City completed the monitoring of 4 programs, with all programs addressing the concerns and findings issued. The City also monitored 2 programs through very detailed claims. Both of the programs were subsistence programs and provided complete client files with the claims. Only one program was not monitored, the Ivy Tech program funded with CDBG-CV.

The City follows the steps below:

Ongoing Review of Project Compliance

- 1. On-site monitoring will be conducted as may be deemed necessary and reasonable by the City. Desk reviews and off-site monitoring will be an ongoing activity.
- 2. Claims for payment are filed, with appropriate documentation, with the program manager. The program manager reviews the claim and approves it for payment.
- 3. Quarterly, monthly, and/or annual reports on project and activity status is required of all subrecipients.
- 4. The program manager will also monitor for beneficiary compliance.
- 5. The City's programs generally do not include program income to the sub-recipient/contractor.

Follow-up and Enforcement

- 1. Compliance concerns are addressed at all phases of an activity, as soon as the project manager is aware of the issue. Technical assistance is provided as necessary to maintain compliance.
- 2. Annual reviews of sub-recipient activities are conducted by the project manager, using a checklist of areas to be reviewed.
- 3. Sub-recipients may be required to file a Certified Public Accountant (CPA) annual report of sub-recipient's financial stability and federally funded project expenditures. Records shall be maintained for five years after project closeout.
- 4. Enforcement of activities not in compliance shall follow Part 85.43 with the right of appeal, as well as termination of a contract/agreement.

The City encourages the use of minority (MBE), women (WBE) and veteran (VBE) owned businesses for each of its programs.

Citizen Participation Plan 91.105(d); 91.115(d)

Describe the efforts to provide citizens with reasonable notice and an opportunity to comment on performance reports.

The City had completed its Language Access Plan (LAP) during PY2021. The data analysis did not find a population size that met the HUD threshold that requires documents to be translated. However, the LAP does recommend that programs funded by CDBG offer documents in Spanish if possible because the Latino(a)(x) population is growing in the community.

The City has resumed public hearings to be in person. However, many residents still like having the option of a virtual format. As such, the City hosts its meetings in a hybrid format. This includes the public hearing it held on December 5, 2022 to discuss this document.

This document, the PY2021 Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report, was available for a fifteen day comment period, December 5, 2022 until December 20, 2022. The City also held a public hearing on December 5, 2022 to discuss the report. Other CDBG related topics included an amendment to its 2019 Action Plan to reallocate a portion of its CDBG-CV funding and to discuss community development needs for the PY2023 Action Plan.

The City did not receive any comments during the 15 day comment period. No members of the public attended the meeting on December 5, 2022.

Specify the nature of, and reasons for, any changes in the jurisdiction's program objectives and indications of how the jurisdiction would change its programs as a result of its experiences.

The City continues to work towards its goals in the five year plan. The City does not anticipate any changes in how it addresses the supportive services or improvements to public facilities. Over the course of the first three years of the Consolidated Plan, the City has expanded its partnerships to provide services in the community. Of the public services funded with CDBG funding, they served 8 extremely low income households, 8 low income households and 8 moderate income households. The single completed public facility project, it served 50 moderate income students with disabilities.

The primary challenge has been to find an affordable housing provider. One attempt in PY2020 did not move forward as the organization was apprehensive in following the federal regulations. In PY2022, the City will partner with Habitat for Humanity, to provide minor home repairs for owner occupied units in Greenwood. The City will work with Habitat to comply with CDBG regulations in partnership with best practices for repair programs of other Habiat affiliates. The goal is to assist 5 low to moderate income households.

The City did not receive any program income in PY2021.
